Providing children and youth with books to read, especially at home, has proven to help to improve literacy, education outcomes and social and emotional skills. Since 2009, First Book Canada has distributed more than 7 million new books and educational resources to programs and schools serving children in need.

With all the research showing the importance of books in the home, we know that evaluating our own work is necessary to staying relevant and planning for the future. I want to take this opportunity to highlight one of our key programs that has shown enormous growth this year: the First Book Canada Marketplace (FBCMP). The FBCMP has begun to have a profound and positive effect in Canada. Not only is it a path for First Book Canada to set a sustainable model, but it also builds a new market for Canadian authors and illustrators and impacts the lives of its primary customers by providing low-cost, quality materials for educators and community leaders serving Canadian children in need throughout the country.

The FBCMP gives educators access to resources on an on-going basis, allowing them to remove barriers to learning by addressing the unique situations facing the kids they serve.

Result: the FBCMP delivers books and resources that the traditional market has failed to deliver, dramatically impacting the cultural and educational resource landscape.

The FBCMP offers high value resources at a fraction of the cost. Educators can make their budgets stretch farther, bringing more resources to more children. Result: More than a quarter of a million books and resources are distributed annually through the FBCMP to high-needs communities.

The FBCMP offers funding support to members through our corporate partnership "gift certificate" opportunities.

Result: These gift certificates allow schools and programs with little or no budget to access and select brand new, high-quality resources for their kids.

The FBCMP is a powerful force for social change, and an innovation that is empowering educators by increasing support for children who need access to educational resources and opportunities.

First Book Canada is working to be a "trusted ally" to educators and community leaders serving kids in need. We have spent the past decade building a strong and dependable relationship with our members (now numbering over 10,000 groups across the country). These members have seen the organization respond to their needs quickly and with substance. Due to this connection, the response to surveys and focus groups has been robust and insightful. In survey after survey, educators have said that they check First Book Canada and the FBCMP for resources before other sources because they support our mission and our organization. They know we are working for them.

We can't do it without you, champions for children in need. Together we can bring the power of reading to millions of Canadian children. Thank you for your support.

THE NEED: Access to Quality Education is Not Equal

Why does having new, high-quality books at home matter?

Providing children and youth with books to read, especially at home, has proven to help to improve literacy, education outcomes and social and emotional competencies. Equal access to quality education is a child's best route out of poverty. Books in the home are more important than a parent's education level in determining a child's education attainment. With fewer than 10 books in the home, a child can fall up to 18 months behind in school and may never catch up. Furthermore, children's literature is an accepted vehicle with which to support social and emotional learning and is found to be more effective than behaviour-based interventions.

First Book Canada believes that education is a child's best path out of poverty, but access to quality education is far from equal.



1.2 million Canadian children live in poverty, representing about **17%** of all Canadian children.



High-quality, age-appropriate books and the stories within provide windows to possibility and mirrors to reflect the legitimacy and power of lived experience.



Almost **25%** of Canadian households **don't** own a single book.



Among [Canadian] individuals in the lowest category of literacy proficiency in 2012, **29%** were in a low-income household.



The children and youth served by our member network throughout Canada face a number of barriers to alleviating poverty, including:

- housing and food insecurity
- ▶ natural disasters
- ▶ refugee and immigrant transition
- ▶ mental health challenges



Nearly all immigrant and refugee families come to Canada without books.

An event for students across the country to have a visit and inspiring presentation by a children's author or illustrator. Students receive a brand-new signed copy of the author of illustrator's book to take home.

BOOKS FOR A BETTER LIFE

Lord Dufferin Public School, Toronto, ON

Elizabeth Baltazar is a teacher at Lord Dufferin, and said that many of her students are living with stressors that adults would have difficulty managing. The majority of students are living in subsidized housing, and the average income for families is around \$15,000. They are dealing with many issues that are associated with living in poverty, and often require support to meet the basic needs of their families. When the students receive books, they share with their siblings and peers.

THE SITUATION

Located in the Regent Park community of Downtown Toronto, many students are newcomers to Canada. There are families that are refugees and who are also involved with the correctional system. Some students are homeless or living in shelters, and have to rely on local food banks and community services to survive.

THE RESPONSE

Lord Dufferin is surrounded by more than 20 different agencies that specialize in support for domestic abuse victims, drug addiction, anti-gang violence, etc. Active community programs give students an opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities and leadership programs. Lord Dufferin offers Adult ESL and Parenting classes for parents and guardians who are not fluent in English.

PROGRESS AND RESULTS

Teachers have noticed that reading levels have increased since students received books from First Book Canada. Students who have received new books often share their books with siblings, or practice reading to them. Students have been inspired to read more, and can often be found discussing their books with fellow classmates around the school.

FUTURE STEPS

First Book Canada works with Lord Dufferin to ensure that students have the opportunity to use education as a way to obtain a different and better life through books. The ongoing support of staff, community members, and involved parents has given students the opportunity to imagine a different life, free of poverty and suffering. **C I**f families require support to feed their families breakfast... buying new books is not a priority. I am grateful that our relationship with First Book Canada is only growing and I know my school community appreciates more opportunities to read and build their literacy skills... plus that there is another organization that cares about them. A Safe Space For Girls To Learn

A Room Of Your Own Book Club, Toronto Public Library, Toronto, ON

Founder and meeting leader, Tanya Lee, grew up in a very challenging family setting. Sometimes her only reprieve was books, where she could dive into compelling characters and be a part of their world instead of her own. Books saved her. As she got older she came to see how many challenges girls face, from mental health and abuse to sexualization and victimization, girls don't have a safe space to be themselves. That's why she started A Room of Your Own Book Club, that has girls age 13 to 18 read and then discuss the book with the author in-person once a month. She's seen the girls shine and empower themselves through reading and meaningful discussion.

THE SITUATION

Tanya Lee knows the struggles that young girls face. The shocking amount of sexual harassment that is still so prevalent, at just 13 years old people begin openly commenting on girls' bodies including adult males. The inequality that girls face in their own families, where boys are allowed more freedom and are visibly revered more. She sees that most of the time, girls don't feel they have anyone to turn to. For Tanya, her saving grace from these harsh realities, and her own troubled home life, came in books. Yet in school she would put forward original ideas as to what the authors meant, only be shut down by teachers claiming authority over the text's interpretations. Despite that, books continued to be her safe space. Connecting her experiences, she created a safe space for girls where they can learn to stand up and get advice as well as get inspired though reading. She gives the girls a chance to interact with authors so as to eliminate the possibility of being marginalized by the education system.

THE RESPONSE

On Friday the 13th, 2016 (a good luck day for Lee) at Lillian H Smith public library, 20 girls showed up to participate in the first meeting for A Room of Your Own Book Club. The girls were all in grade 8 at Samuel Hearn PS, based on a proposal that Tanya sent to their principal. They came with their Vice Principal and a TDSB employee. Kelly Armstrong was the first author, the book had been released a month in advance and the girls had stayed up all night before the meeting to finish it. They loved the book and they got the chance to ask Armstong their own hard-hitting questions, one on one. Tanya also partnered with Dr. Karen Wang at Sunnybrook to give a focus of mental health to all the book club meetings.

PROGRESS AND RESULTS

Since then, over 600 at risk girls from priority areas of the GTA have attended the monthly meetings over the past 2.5 years. The average meeting has 25 to 40 girls attending. Through First Cook Canada Tanya has been able to bring mini-library collections of books for the girls to take home. The meetings usually have the author do a reading from their book and then a Q and A, which can be an impactful experience for all as it brought the author of Paper Hearts, Meg Wiviott, to tears. Lee has seen confidence wane in girls as they get older, but the book club combats that notion and gives them more assurance in their desire for reading, their ability to ask questions the faith they have in themselves.

FUTURE STEPS

Lee has big plans for the book club. She is starting to see girls with different reading abilities at the meetings, and wants to get audio books and time to work through chapters with smaller groups before meetings to further encourage them to join in. She wants to start a summer Read-a-thon through North America and has sent in a taped request to Oprah to help her launch this project and receive funding so she can buy hundreds of new books from the First Book Canada Marketplace. As well, she wants to set up a livestream of the meetings across North America to help her spread the message of what a necessity it is that we give girls a safe place to speak.

THE FAMILY ROOM: BRINGING FAMILIES TOGETHER Winnipeg, MB

Parent Resource Coordinators work with the Family Rooms, school budget funded gathering places in community schools, within the inner city and core. These rooms serve as a resource for parents in the communities, supplying access to necessities such as food and telephone lines, and access to books. Parent Resource Coordinators recruit parents of preschoolers to join the events at the Family Room. In the literacy program within the Family Room, there are 50 people (parents with children) at any given time. Parents are encouraged to read in their own language based off a story's pictures if English-language skills are still developing. First Book Canada helps to provide books for kids visiting the Family Room, many of whom may not otherwise have access to new books.

THE SITUATION

The inner city and core of Winnipeg is a diverse community, with many newcomers to Canada who have experienced war-trauma and are navigating language barriers. In addition to dealing with poor housing, health issues, and food instability, newcomer families must also confront the stressor of gangs, who often recruit children right out of the airport. Many Indigenous children have been placed in foster care, and are dealing with the stress and trauma of being pulled from their families.

THE RESPONSE

The Family Room, alongside a network of community programs, is a space for families to access basic needs and spend the quality time that they need to strengthen their family. Parent Resource Coordinators work as a bridge to the community for these families who are new to Canada or are struggling with barriers as a result of low-income.

PROGRESS AND RESULTS

The children and students who receive books from First Book Canada begin to talk about what they can do, careers they didn't realize were possible, and places they want to visit. The books they receive become an open door to what is possible. Staff have seen kids who visited the Family Room as preschoolers with their parents return to their library pop-ups as elementary school students.

FUTURE STEPS

The continued support of parents in the community, and from the corporate volunteers who come in and read with the students, has been immensely valuable. The Parent Resource Coordinator would like to acknowledge all that First Book Canada has done for kids who visit the Family Rooms. The opportunity that First Book Canada has given to rural areas across Canada is crucial in strengthening families in need.
